June marks the beginning of purple week for the summer. During purple week (check



your solid waste calendar) you can put your composter out for collection every week on collection day. You can also put out paper leaf collection bags and bundles of twigs.

## A Toilet is Not a Trash Can

Just because something says it can be flushed, doesn't mean It should be flushed!



Many items we use on a daily basis like wipes and personal

hygiene products cannot go down our toilets or drains. Flushing these items can cause damage to the wastewater treatment system and may potentially cause sewer backups in your home.

The wastewater treatment system is designed to treat and process wastewater from our homes and businesses. The process breaks down the waste so it can be filtered and removed before the disinfected water is returned to the environment. These items DO NOT break down and present a threat to the functioning of the system. They can cause blockages, increased maintenance, equipment malfunctions and can even contribute to environmental spills and overflows. These items should be disposed of properly in the garbage and/or green bin where they cannot damage our wastewater treatment system.

#### Cross Connection Control



The Town's Water Utility is excited to announce that we will be launching a CROSS-CONNECTION CONTROL PROGRAM to help protect

the public drinking water system, and its users.

Many communities in NS have put in place Cross-Connection Control (CCC) Programs to safeguard their water systems from water flowing backwards into the public water system, which presents a risk of contamination, as well as a potential risk to your property's water system. This safeguard is achieved through the installation of backflow preventers.

CCC Programs are generally supported by water use bylaws, and/or utility regulations mandating that backflow prevention devices are installed and maintained to prevent backflow of potentially hazardous substances into the water supply. Programs typically monitor the installation, maintenance, and field testing of backflow preventers within a distribution system. CCC Programs are an important part of a multi-barrier approach to protecting safe drinking water.

The Town's Water Utility is partnering with BSI Online to help us launch our new CCC Program. BSI Online will be maintaining an organized database of water customers with backflow preventers and ensuring these are kept up to date with the current testing requirements.

#### **EV Charging Program**



If you have an electric vehicle, you can receive a \$25 monthly credit on your electrical bill.

The EV Charging Program is a two-year program beginning April 2024. All you need to do is supply us with your charging data each month and you will receive a credit on your next bill.

Your data will be analyzed by our Climate and Energy Department to determine when residents most regularly charge their vehicles. This information will be used to create a time-of-use rate structure with the goal of incentivizing resident EV owners to charge their vehicles during hours when our local renewables are available (Ellershouse Wind Farm and the Town's Solar Garden).

# Are you locked up and secure for the night?

Join the #9PMRoutine today and take an active role in crime prevention in your neighbourhood and community.

The #9PMRoutine is a campaign used by police agencies across North America to remind citizens to protect themselves and their property.

What do I need to do?

There are simple steps you can take to help prevent crime in your neighbourhood.

Every night at 9pm:

- Remove valuables from your vehicle and ensure it's locked and windows are closed.
- Close all garage windows and lock any garage doors, especially those leading into your house
- Keep your vehicle registration and insurance documents secure. The documents can be used to commit other crimes
- Check and lock all house doors and shut all windows
- Turn on an exterior light
- Close and lock your fence gate
- Lock your shed
- Put away bikes and toys in your yard
- Park in the garage instead of the street, if possible.

# Illegal Burning

The province has recently increased the fine for violating the daily burn restrictions to \$25,000.



From March 15 to October 15, daily burn restrictions are in place to help prevent wildfires. Burning is not permitted anywhere in the province between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. because that is often when the risk of wildfires is greatest. The BurnSafe map remains red during those hours every day.

Each day at 2 p.m., the map is updated to show the daily restrictions:

- red means burning is not permitted that day
- yellow means burning is permitted after 7 p.m.
- green means burning is permitted after 2 p.m.
